Introduction: (About the program and its study system)

English Department offers an integrated academic program that qualifies students academically and professionally to work in the fields that require English language knowledge. Courses have been developed to lead students- in systematic and programmed steps- to a high degree of language proficiency and academic achievement. It has been taken into consideration in the bachelor's degree (arts stream) to train students to develop independent thinking and express themselves, verbally or written. Students in the program study linguistic courses and English literature to get prepared to become teachers, translators, linguists or literary critics. Excellent students are given the opportunity to work as assistant teachers, and then they get scholarships to study master's and doctorate inside or outside the Kingdom.

Study System:

The study is based on the credit hours system. The study duration and the number of required hours in the program are described below:

The Bachelor's degree in English (Arts stream) includes four years of studying academic courses divided into 7 levels in addition to a Practicum Course, and it will be awarded after the students complete the following requirements:

1. Meeting the conditions and items specified in the unified regulations for postgraduate studies in Saudi universities.
2. Studying at least (129) credit units successfully.

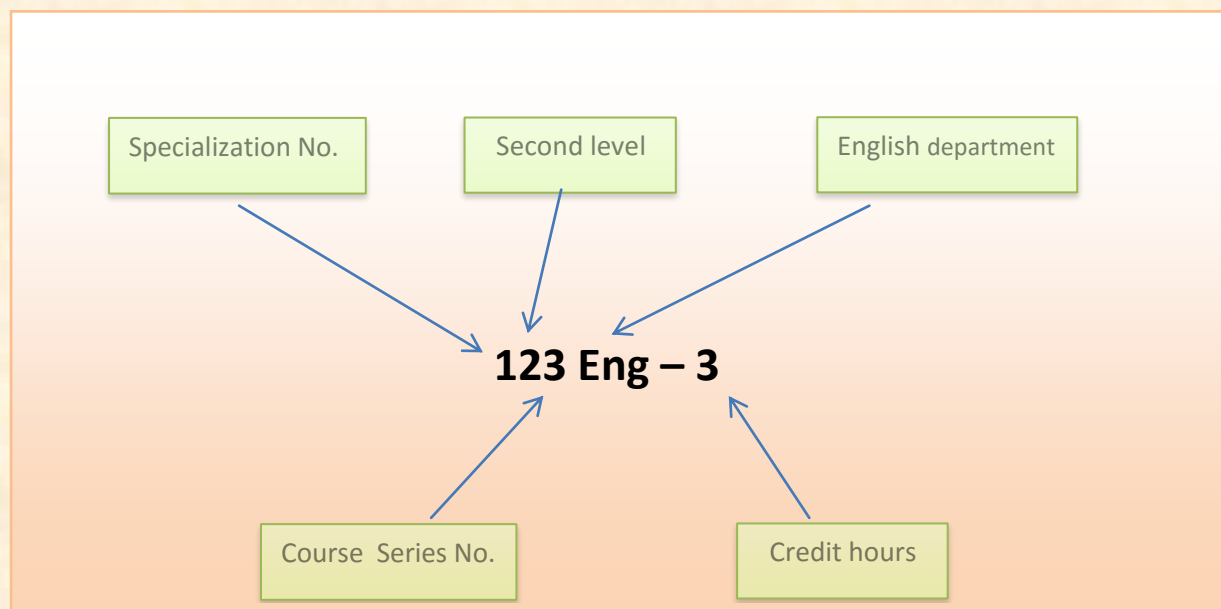
